Message from the Chairman

Well, I believe the rainy season has now come to an end and the days are getting longer at last. Here's looking forward to another summer like last year. I expect most of you now will be looking forward to a holiday, so don't forget to put away ladders and garden tools, cancel the milk/papers/mail and tell a neighbour when you will be away.

I would also like to remind you about safety in the home. We have had problems in the past with opportunistic burglaries in our town when thieves have stolen vehicles parked on driveways and purses or wallets have been taken from downstairs rooms at night. Make sure you close and lock all doors and windows when you go out and at night, and keep your valuables and keys hidden from view. Fire in the home is also a constant danger, so a sensible 'going to bed' checklist would be:

turn off and unplug electrical appliances if they are not designed to be left on check your cooker is switched off

don't leave the washing machine or dishwasher on

turn off heaters

put up fireguards if appropriate

put out candles and cigarettes properly

close all inside doors to stop fire spreading quickly

ideally take your valuables and keys into the bedroom

Many of these actions are just common sense. But, ask yourself, are you guilty of not doing some or all of them?

Be aware of doorstep crime and never open the door if you are not sure of the caller. Make sure you have a spy hole and chain fitted so you don't have to open the door fully. We have a supply of door stickers to deter cold callers. If your street Coordinator does not have any you can pick them up at any of our public meetings (see back page for details).

All these things help to deter the villains and keep your home safe.

Great Weston Air Ambulance Charitypresented by Nicole Beebee

Nicole Beebee explained the first Air Ambulance was formed in 1987 in Cornwall as a one year government trial project. It was thought to be an experiment and so it was funded by a charity. By 2013 there were 22 charities running over 30 helicopters. The helicopter ambulances are employed to support the hard to get to locations and they bring A & E to the patient and meet most



patient needs the for best outcomes. Decision to fly is decided by the pilot whose first concern is safety. The Charity also has 2 rapid response vehicles night use when

the helicopter cannot fly. The team is made of 2 pilots, 6 critical care paramedics and volunteer doctors on a shift rota. On a 999 call the call handler will send an ambulance but if the despatch criteria are met then the air ambulance will be called.

Their current helicopter, a Bolkow 105, was designed for military use and has been in service since 1970 but it cannot land on hospital helipads, is limited to a maximum speed of 150mph, only provides four seats and the patient is loaded from the rear. This is due to be replaced by a Eurocopter EC135 which provides 40% extra cabin space, additional seat (for friend/relative), greater hospital access, side loading and will be 4 minutes faster.


Crime levels in Nailsea between May 2013 and January 2014

Since the last edition of newsletter the Nailsea beat team have been targeting patrols in and around Somerset Square after recent reports of Anti-Social Behaviour from shop keepers and local residents December to February 2014. It has been reported that damage has been occurring to the vacant buildings on the square.

With extra patrols the offenders have been highlighted and arrested, since the intervention the calls of ASB have reduced. I would urge any members of the community to report to the police any incidents of ASB by calling the police on 101 or if urgent assistance is required 999.


Garage and Shed breaks

I would like to remind all NHW members to be aware of what you keep in your sheds and outbuildings. During January and February 2014 the outlying villages such as Wrington, Congresbury and Long Ashton were targeted by thieves who broke into sheds and outbuildings stealing gardening equipment, tools and bikes. On one evening approximately 30 address were targeted in Wrington alone. A common link we found while attending these crime scenes was that a number of the sheds had no locks. I would always advocate that all buildings should be as secure as possible with a 'Sold Secure' tested lock on the door. Garages are also a vulnerable target and I would urge members that if they have valuable contents then a garage defender is fitted Thankfully in Nailsea we were not to the door. targeted as much as other areas, the good news was that police colleagues caught a number of suspected offenders and the break-ins have dramatically reduced.






Comparison of crime types in Nailsea between May 2013 and January 2014


