Guest speaker - Chief Inspector Alex Cohen, District Commander

Our guest speaker was to be Nick Gargan, Chief Constable, but unfortunately he was called away on

important business. In his place Chief Inspector Alex Cohen, District Commander, gave an excellent talk on what has been happening within the Avon and Somerset Constabulary. He explained what keeps Nick Gargan awake at nights:

- 1) Finance
- 2) Performance improvement
- 3) Developing the organisation
- 4) Changing the culture.

Chief Inspector Cohen explained that the constabulary has had a 27% cut in its budget, which has resulted in substantial changes to the way the Constabulary operates. Changes include a) reductions at the top of the organisation, with senior officers taking on more responsibility, b) reductions in the size of the property portfolio, c) provision of modern custody centres to replace outdated facilities spread across the Force area. However, there will be no reductions in our local Police team and it is very likely that current Nailsea Police Station building will remain with the Police sharing occupancy with other Station opening hours will change organisations. although details are not yet available. Across the whole of Avon & Somerset only 1 Police station is closing. The others will either relocate or be colocated with other Agencies. The new Custody Centres will open in Patchway, Keynsham and Bridgwater during the summer. There will be investment in new technology to facilitate better resourcing, intelligence and processing arrests. The new Force Operating Model is currently being piloted in South Gloucestershire and Mendip and will be rolled out during 2015.

Following an independent survey, Avon & Somerset was found to be the 6th best in the UK for public confidence. Nevertheless Chief Inspector Cohen admitted that the Police have a mountain to climb in restoring its reputation with the public. Detected crime has improved over the past few years and this has helped to bring down the level of crime. The Chief constable is driving a change in culture with a focus on the Constabulary working for the public, not

Policing the public.

The staffing structure at Nailsea will change. Front line staffing will at least remain the same. There will be Neighbourhood Manager based in Weston Super Mare responsible for managing issues, with no staff responsibility.

The chief Inspector concluded by answering questions from the floor

Our local Inspector thanked all Nailsea members of Neighbourhood Watch for their efforts on behalf of the Police. He explained that his role is only temporary until the end of the year when a Neighbourhood Manager will take over, based in Weston Super Mare. Our local Inspector spoke to the latest crime figures (see facing

page). Shoplifting has been on the increase and major efforts are being deployed to combat this crime. Also, villains are now targeting garage and sheds, so make sure your outbuildings are made secure. It is a good practice to get your bicycle physically marked on the

Bike Register. You can do this by booking an appointment at Nailsea by calling 101. The charge is £5 per cycle •

PACT

At the April meeting, our local Police team reported that crimes detected has risen to around 35% from what was a disappointing less than 20% a few of years ago. Recently there has been ASB in Millennium Park and the skate park. Three new volunteers and one former volunteer have agreed to join the SpeedWatch team and to be trained.

PACT support was provided for the application for a crossing over Queens Road by a blind resident at a town council meeting recently. At a discussion with the town centre manager it was revealed that Precinct signage will be improved in the Autumn but the detail is not yet clear.

The car park issue remains unresolved and the town council continues to resist North Somerset council's attempts to take over in order to charge for parking. In response to a letter to Elfan Ap Rees, Mr Rees advised the chair that NS Council would continue to resist any transfer of parking enforcement powers from Police to the council as they would not be able to afford resources to cover the whole district.

Anti-Social Behaviour will be the priority due to the impending long evenings and potentially, good weather which may encourage thoughtless behaviour outdoors. PACT will be represented at the Nailsea Showcase event on 19 July 2014 at the Millennium Park, and at the PACT conference at Portishead Police HQ on 7 June.

The next PACT meeting will be on Tuesday 1st July at Nailsea Fire Station. The meeting is open to anyone, so come along and discuss those issues you care about •


Police successes

Burglars caught

At the end of April the Nailsea beat team were assisting colleagues from Clevedon in capturing a burglar. The home owner answered the door to a suspect who was asking for something which had gone into the victim's garden. Whilst distracting the victim and asking them to go to the garden, the front door was left open and unattended. This allowed the suspect to enter the house and steal items from the

DC Steve WEBB from the Nailsea crime team began investigating the offence and with local knowledge from beat officers a suspect was identified and has been arrested for the offence.

Also as part of a rural crime initiative officers were conducting a stop check along the A38 in Langford. Whist carrying out the patrols observations were put out for a vehicle which was recently involved in a burglary in Shipham, Somerset. The vehicle was spotted heading on the A38 towards Bristol and stopped. Inside the vehicle were a number of expensive power tools which had been stolen from across North Somerset. The driver of the vehicle was charged with burglary

What to do after a burglary

Hopefully none of you will have to read further than the title above but we thought it would be useful to compile a list of what to do.

1. Contact the Police

If you think there could be someone still in your property **do not enter the premises.** Find somewhere safe to make your phone call outside the house, e.g. from your car or a neighbour's house.

- 2. Don't touch, move or clear up any mess either inside and outside the property until the Police arrive.
- 3. Make sure you receive a crime report number from the Police. You will need this for your Insurance Company.
- 4. Make a list of all stolen or damaged items.
- **5. Inform your bank** to cancel debit/credit cards and cheque books. Also check that your driving licence and passport have not been taken.

6. Contact your Insurance company

Check if your policy covers Home Emergency to establish if emergency locksmith and other repair costs can be claimed for. Make sure to keep any receipts for any work done. Also check policy details regarding home computers. Some policies will not pay for data loss if no adequate backup copies have been kept.

7. Secure your property as soon as possible.

Even if entry wasn't made through the door, house keys could have been taken so changing all locks is needed.

8. Keep an eye on local pawn brokers, payday loan shops, local adverts and on-line adverts selling second hand items. Most thieves want to turn your property quickly to into cash. Don't forget to inform the Police and your Insurance Company if you do manage to retrieve any of your property.

Burglary is a very traumatic and upsetting experience even if nothing has been taken and children especially can be very distressed and anxious. The Police will give you details of Victim Support which offers free confidential counselling, help and advice. This is available to everyone even if the crime has not been reported to the Police. Victim Compensation

If someone is arrested and convicted for your burglary, the Court can award you compensation from the offender but you need to inform the police in advance if you would want to claim this.

Finally, two points to leave you with: (i) second time robberies are actually very rare, and (ii) 9 out of 10 burglar alarms are bought after a burglary and then half are never turned on!
