#### **Anti Social Behaviour in the Town Centre**





We have received a number of reports of incidents of anti social behaviour in and around the town centre. The locations include the vacant Weston College building near the library, the play area on Somerset Square and the covered walkway at Clevedon Walk. There have also been reports of youths hanging around the stairwells and being a general nuisance.

There have also been attempts to break in to the Weston College building which has since been boarded up. These incidents occur most often though not entirely on an evening.

We routinely patrol these areas when on duty and have instigated a Problem Solving Plan to deal with the issue. We have identified certain individuals and shall deal if they persist. We shall visit the home addresses and issue a warning.

Incidents of graffiti has been rearing its head in Nailsea of late and of particular prominence has been the Brik tag. Enquiries are ongoing. If you are able to assist with our enquiries please call 101 or email quoting 5222019101

Graffiti is regarded by most as a form of criminal damage and can be defined as 'any inscription, marking, writing, painting or drawing, illicitly scratched, scribbled, drawn, cut, carved, posted, pasted sprayed or painted on any surface'. Note the word 'illicitly'.

The surface or canvas upon which the graffiti is applied is normally vertical and in public view, because those who apply their tags or 'works of art' (known as pieces – short for masterpieces) want them to be seen. Graffiti is applied to stationary objects such as walls, fences, trees, street furniture and street cabinets and also to moving objects, such as railway carriages, buses and commercial vehicles.
