At a national level there are now estimated to be in excess of 10 million members of Neighbourhood Watch, if some of them only do put a sticker in the window. Nailsea Watch now covers 3,900 households with 168 street coordinators or contact persons (some of whom are also area distributors for our newsletter). I would like to thank each and every one of them and our members for the work they do. There is much to be said for people who watch out for others acting suspiciously in their streets. We cannot rely solely on the Police, not least because there are fewer of them on the beat than there used to be. Vigilance is a matter for us all, not something done by someone else or proxied out to the Police. Nailsea Watch is run by the members and that is something we should be proud of.

We have seen changes in our local Neighbourhood Police Team, and on behalf of all the members I would like to thank them for the work they do. I sincerely hope that they will continue to have a prominent presence in the centre of town in the future. There have been several changes in watch Co coordinators this year, so I would like to thank all those who have volunteered and also the retiring coordinators for their service over the years.

Nailsea continues to have a relatively low level of crime. However, we cannot be complacent. Burglaries from sheds and outbuildings have started to exceed those from dwellings, so we all need to pay particular attention to building security. Online scams are an increasing threat to our personal security so be especially careful when working online. There are useful hints and tips on our website.

We have made a conscious effort to replace all the worn out and damaged signs around the town with the help of Barry the Bobby Van man. As you already know we will have to be self sufficient from January when Barry will no longer be able to provide this service. We will continue to supply new and replacement signs, but the local Coordinators will need to arrange to have them erected as and when necessary.

I hope some of you have had a look at our web site and have found it useful. The site is averaging over 30 visits a day (1000 visits each month; the most popular pages are Ringmaster messages). If you have any ideas on how we can improve it then please let us

After several years the Committee have decided to re-instate the visit to Houses of Parliament. Well, it was vastly over-subscribed, so the lucky ones had to be decided by draw. We look forward to an enjoyable day on 1st September when we will have a tour of both houses and a meeting with our North Somerset MP Dr Fox in Committee room afterwards. Hopefully, we will be able to arrange another visit later next year after the General Election.

Unfortunately we are no longer officially twinned with Cumberland Park, South Australia. We will however be keeping in touch with our contact there, Terry Harbour, and we will publish any relevant news both in the newsletter and on the web site.

Gill McConachie has decided to stand down from Committee after 6 years as Treasurer and I would like to thank her personally for her excellent work over the past 6 years. I would also like to report that due to the healthy state of our funds, we have decided that there will be a one year moratorium on subscriptions.

Finally, I would like to thank all the Committee for their valuable contributions, Jill & Geoff for collating the newsletters and Margaret, Pauline and Audrey for providing the refreshments. I hope you have enjoyed our meetings and guest speakers this year. I am always looking for new ones so let us know if you have a particular request. I know I don't need to remind you of all those things you should do to keep safe, so stay vigilant and together we will keep crime down in Nailsea .

Guest Speaker Nick Churchill Portishead Lifeboat

Nick Churchill gave a presentation on the Portishead Lifeboat, its history and future. The need for a lifeboat we originally wanted by the Yacht Club to cover for accidents but more and more requests came from the Coast Guard and Bristol docks for rescues. The lifeboat has during its 25 year life made 364 rescues and saved 15 lives. The community lifeboat is run as a charitable trust. Nationally, there

are 33 community lifeboats. The original and current boathouse is a Compton prefab garage which is just large enough for the boat with launching tractor. The crew have to move the lifeboat out of the garage before space can be found for them to change. There are no toilets or shower facilities they use the amenities in the Yacht Club. The Portishead Bristol Lifeboat Trust is

run by its volunteer Directors, with each Director having his or her own specific responsibilities. Running costs include maintenance of the boat and tractor, MOT of tractor, fuel etc. The area supported by the Lifeboat reaches across to Wales, down to Clevedon/Weston and up to the New Seven Bridge.

When a request for assistance is received from the Coast Guard, it is the Portishead Launch Officer who decides if the boat is launched, depending upon the nature of the rescue or sea conditions (the Lifeboat cannot currently be launched on a low spring tide). The crew, including ladies, are all aged under 45 and they come from all walks of life. They train each Tuesday evening and obviously turn up for call outs. Between April and October it is the silly season

when boating people, water skiers etc get into trouble. Each time the lifeboat is launched, it has to be washed on its return. The future of the Portishead Lifeboat looks brighter since the RLNI will be taking on sponsorship of the Lifeboat once the new lifeboat station has been built. The new station will cost £1.8M, however the RLNI require the community to fund 10% of the cost i.e. £180,000. The new location will assist faster launching and recovery of the lifeboat in what is very challenging beach terrain. When someone is in trouble at sea, seconds can make the difference between life and death. Also, there will be no restrictions at low water, so the new station will be operational 24/7. For the crew, the improved facilities will include changing rooms, dry storage facilities and hot showers. There will be an office, a training room and casualty reception facilities.

Nick answered a number of questions from the audience and ended by appealing for donations to help raise the required £180,000 for the new lifeboat station •



On the Beat

Rouge Traders

Please, please, please be aware of cold callers attending at your home address. Now that we are well and truly into the summer months the Nailsea beat team have noticed a rise in 'cold callers' trading in Nailsea

and the surrounding towns. By cold callers I mean workmen who attend at your home address and offer to do a trade be it driveway maintonance, gardening or other forms of building repair. DO NOT ACCEPT THEIR BUSINESS, the majority of tradesmen who cold-call are either conmen or will offer shoddy workmanship. The law has recently changed, as from June 2014 any tradesman attending at your home address where a contract is drawn up has to give 14 clear days for a cooling off period, this must be in writing with a contract which also clearly shows how the contract can be cancelled. Often these contracts will say that the termination has to be in writing. This is not the case, telephone or email are both acceptable ways to cancel. Be aware of giving a deposit, if you write a cheque you will often find it will be cashed prior to the 14 day cooling off period expiring. When paying any form of deposit, cash or cheque, once it's been handed over it is very difficult to get back. If you must pay, then use a cheque and postdate it to after the cooling off period. If you are talked into any form of work then get more quotes, it is good practice to have at least three quotes before you have any work carried out to compare what different tradesmen can offer you. Last but not least you are the customer. If you do not want their trade then say NO, don't let them into your house and tell them to go away. If you have any vulnerable neighbours please be on the lookout for rouge traders that are calling.

Burglaries

At the recent Neighbourhood Watch AGM I gave out the following figures in relation to the reduction in the past two years with Burglaries in the home and non-dwelling burglaries (sheds and garages). Between June 2012 and June 2013 there were a total of 34 burglaries reported to the police that was June to June. For the same period 2013 to 2014 there were only 15 reported burglaries that's a 44% reduction. It's a similar story with non-dwelling burglaries with a 67% reduction year on year
