I would like to thank each and every one of our Scheme Coordinators for their support during the year. I would also like to thank all retired members for their support of Neighbourhood Watch in the past. There is much to be said for people who watch out for others acting suspiciously in their streets. As I have said before, we cannot rely solely on the Police, not least because there are fewer of them than there used to be. Vigilance is a matter for us all, not something done by someone else. Nailsea Neighbourhood Watch is run by the members for the members and that is something we should all be proud of.

We have seen yet more changes in our local Neighbourhood Police Team, and on behalf of all the members I would like to thank them for the work they do. It would be nice to think these will be the last changes for a while to provide some continuity. We also hope our Police Team will continue to have a prominent presence in the centre of town when they relocate from the present Police Station.

Nailsea continues to have a relatively low level of crime. Burglaries from sheds and outbuildings are still occurring. We all need to be extra careful in making sure all our assets and possessions are secure at all times. You will have noticed from the national news and our website that villains are now increasingly turning their attention to online crime. Online scams are an increasing threat to our personal security so be especially careful when working online. We have started to highlight some of these in this newsletter and publish details on the Nailsea NHW website (www.nailseanhw.org.uk).

With your help we are continuing to make sure street signs are replaced as and when necessary. The visible presence of Neighbourhood Watch on our streets does help to deter crime.

Our website continues to grow in content and I hope you are making use of it. The site is averaging over 30 visits a day, the most popular page is 'Ringmaster messages'. If you have any ideas on how we can improve it then please let us know.

Our Houses of Parliament visit in September 2014 was a great success. It was vastly oversubscribed, so we have arranged another visit on July 20th. At the time of publication I can say that everyone really enjoyed the trip.

As always my thanks go to all of the Committee for their valuable contributions during the year; Jill & Geoff Collard for collating the newsletters; and Margaret and Janet for providing the refreshments. I hope you have enjoyed our meetings and guest speakers this past year. We now have a full programme of different guest speakers up to the end of 2016 so please do come along to the meetings when you are able.

Finally I must give all members notice that, regrettably due to future commitments and after many years' service, both Mike West and I will be retiring from the Committee in July 2016.

Guest Speaker: Sheila Round Nailsea and Backwell Macular Support Group

Sheila Round was our guest speaker for the July meeting. She described Age-related Macular Degeneration (AMD) of the eye. The macula is part of the retina at the back of the eye and responsible for most of our colour vision and the fine detail of what we see. When the cells at the back of the eye degenerate you then start to rely more on your peripheral vision.

There are two forms of degeneration; wet and dry. Dry is a gradual deterioration of the macula as the retinal cells die off and are not renewed. It develops over many months or years. In Wet macular degeneration abnormal blood vessels grow into the macular. These leak blood or fluid which leads to scarring of the macular and rapid loss of central vision. Wet AMD can develop very suddenly and one should go immediately to A&E since treatment will stop it getting worse. Treatment involves an injection into the eye after anaesthetization. NB A problem in one eye can be compensated by the other eye and therefore be hidden. Sheila recommended a check using the Amsler grid (these were available at the meeting but the chart can be down loaded from the web). If a problem is found using the grid then go directly to A&E for an investigation. Unfortunately there is no treatment as yet for dry macular degeneration.

There are a number of causes of Age-related Macular Degeneration:

Age: Age is the main risk factor. From 1 in 2000 people at age 60 to 1 in 5 by the age of 90 have AMD.



Smoking: Smoking damages blood vessels and the structure of the eye. Smokers are three times more likely to develop macular degeneration than non smokers.

Diet: A poor diet low in fruit and vegetables may increase the risk of AMD. Antioxidants and other substances in fruit and vegetables protect the body against the effects of "free radicals". These are unstable molecules which damage cells or prevent cell repair. **Alcohol** destroys antioxidants. **Obesity** and a diet with lots of sugars and hydrogenated or saturated fats also increase the risk of developing AMD.

Blood pressure: People with high blood pressure are one and half times more likely to have AMD than those with normal blood pressure.

Sunlight: Macular cells are sensitive to ultra violet (UV) radiation and visible blue light which occurs naturally in sunlight. Cell damage from blue light may cause deterioration of the macula. This vulnerability can be reduced by wearing a hat with a brim/visor to shade the eyes from direct sunlight and wearing lenses which block UV and blue light to reduce glare.

Genetics: A family history of macular degeneration may increase the chance of developing AMD.

Gender: More women than men are diagnosed with AMD.

On 15th July Nailsea police were made aware of private sexual images being placed in public locations in Nailsea. The local police acted instantly on the information and arrested a suspect later the same day.

The man appeared in court on July 30th and admitted the new offence of disclosing private sexual images with intent to cause distress and a second

charge of harassment. He was handed a six-month suspended prison sentence by North Somerset Magistrates. It is the first time anyone within the Avon and Somerset Constabulary force area has been sentenced for the new offence.

Scam Corner

Fake Designer Goods

People looking for a cheap designer bargain online are being targeted by fraudsters advertising fake designer goods. The items received are usually cheap and inferior counterfeits of handbags, clothes and sunglasses amongst other things.

The general rule is 'if it looks too good to be true then it probably is.' Designer products sold at heavily discounted prices are an immediate sign that something isn't quite right.

What can you do to protect yourself?

- Where possible, buy from well-known, High Street retailers. If you've never heard of a firm, or it is based overseas, be sceptical.
- Avoid paying by cheque or bank transfer. Use PayPal or a credit card as they will give you additional protection.
- Search the internet. Type the website you are buying from and look for reviews of what others customers are saying about the company. Bad customer service feedback usually finds it's way online quite quickly.
- Check for spelling mistakes or poor grammar on websites as this may suggest the website has been put together by a fraudster.

Rio 2015 Olympics Lottery scam

The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) has received intelligence regarding two new Lottery Fraud letters/email attachments (Scam 1 & Scam 2) using the 2016 Rio Olympics as a theme.

The scams try to trick people into believing they have won the following:

Scam 1: An online lottery prize of £650,000 and a trip to Brazil to watch the Olympics as the recipient's email address was chosen out of a possible ten million at random.

Scam 2: An online lottery prize of £820,000 and a trip to Brazil to watch the Rio Carnival and the Olympics as the recipient's winning numbers 8 17 34 38 42 and 51 were selected.


Protect yourself from lottery fraud

- Never respond to any such communication. If you have not entered a lottery then you cannot have won it.
- Official lotteries in other countries operate in much the same way as the UK's National Lotto.
- No official lotteries that we know of contact people to tell them of their win.
- We do not know of any official lottery operators who ask for fees to collect winnings. Any request for a fee payment is a good indication that someone is trying to defraud you.
- Never disclose your bank details or pay fees in advance.
- If they have provided an email address to respond to, be very suspicious of addresses such as @hotmail.com or @yahoo.com or numbers beginning with 07 because these are free to get hold of.
- Genuine lotteries thrive on publicity. If they ask you to keep your win a secret, it is likely to be a fraud.
- Many fraudulent lotteries have bad spelling and grammar see this as a warning that fraudsters are at work.




Total crimes for the Nailsea NHW area* (July 2014 to June 2015)
